


SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

Simply defined, **Situational Awareness** is knowing what is going on around you. There are many careers where situational awareness is imperative for personal and public safety, such as in aviation, law enforcement, military and construction. It's also very important in our everyday lives. Being aware of one's surroundings with relation to the activity in which one is involved can prevent accidents. Being mindful of terrain when hiking, weather when boating, road conditions and other drivers when driving, are a few examples.

Distractions hamper our situational awareness skills.


If the car beside you suddenly enters your lane, will you have a plan to avoid a crash? The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that 80%



form of driver inattentiveness within three seconds before the event. Eating, grooming, phone calls, conversations with passengers, and the radio are distractions when driving.

Take a look around your home. Are there hazards that might lead to a fall or injury during that brief moment when you might not be giving an activity your full attention? Is there a throw rug at the bottom of the stairs that you are quickly descending? Or maybe an appliance or extension cord lying in a place that might cause you to trip? Is that ladder you just leaned against your house level and appropriately supported?

We can all sharpen our awareness skills by using all of our senses, not just our eyes. Pay attention to surroundings and ask yourself if you're missing anything. The more we practice situational awareness, the easier it gets until it becomes habit.
