NATIONAL CHIMNEY SAFETY WEEK

SEPTEMBER 30 - OCTOBER 6

Fall officially begins on September 23. What better time than September to ready your home for winter? Those of us who heat our homes utilizing fireplaces or wood stoves are aware of the potential for a chimney fire.

SIGNS of a chimney fire:

- ◆Loud, cracking and popping noise
- ◆Dense smoke
- ◆Intense, hot smell

CREOSOTE is the residue that sticks to walls of chimneys as a result of burning wood, and is highly combustible.



Conditions that encourage buildup of creosote:

- •Restricted air supply
- Unseasoned wood
- ◆Cooler than normal chimney temperature

The Chimney Safety Institute of America (CSIA) and your local fire department (ESFD) highly recommend a yearly chimney inspection and sweeping.

Products approved by the CSIA for fireplaces

- •Creosote Sweeping Logs (CSL) nothing replaces physical sweeping, but when used with an annual inspection, these help reduce the risk of a chimney fire.
- •ChimFex a chimney fire extinguisher that removes oxygen from the chimney thereby smothering the fire. Be sure to follow the instructions for use.

Our Auxiliary will fund the purchase of a Zoll AutoPulse Chest Compression Device for East Side Fire. This device provides automated mechanical chest compressions supporting cardiac arrest resuscitation. AutoPulse will allow our responders to provide consistent, high-quality CPR for extended periods of time, both on-scene and during transport, if necessary. Additionally, once deployed, this tool frees up critical resources to perform other interventions such as airway management, respirations and AED monitoring.
